Tour Historic Homes - Stroll Charming Streets - Visit Oregon's Oldest Airport

Albany is where Oregon's past comes beautifully to life. With the state's most diverse collection of architectural styles—from the 1850s to the 1950s—visitors can journey through three nationally recognized historic districts, each filled with character, craftsmanship, and charm. Take a self-guided walking tour through the Downtown Commercial, Hackleman, and Monteith Districts to see more than 800 historic homes and buildings that tell the story of a city steeped in heritage.

For a peek inside, plan your trip around one of Albany's signature events, the **Historic Interior Home Tours**.

Summer Home Tour (last Saturday in July)
Step inside beautifully preserved homes, where
friendly hosts and homeowners share personal stories
of restoration and why they love calling Albany home.
You can also visit historic buildings like the Monteith
House Museum (Albany's oldest frame house, 1849),
Albany Historic Carousel & Museum, Carnegie Library,
and more.

Christmas Parlour Tour (second Sunday in December) Celebrate the season with twinkling lights, holiday music, and Victorian flair. Ride a trolley or horse-drawn wagon—or enjoy a self-paced walk or drive—as you tour festively decorated historic homes, churches, and museums. It's a magical way to experience Albany's holiday spirit.

Historic District Highlights

Monteith District: Named after Albany's founders, Thomas and Walter Monteith, this area features the Monteith House, Albany's first frame home built in 1849. Now operating as the Monteith House Museum, it is considered the most accurately restored pioneerera home in Oregon and has drawn the interest of preservationists nationwide.

Hackleman District: Named after early settler Abner Hackleman, this 28-block district showcases a wide variety of architectural styles, including Queen Anne, Italianate, and Gothic Revival. Highlights include the George Earle Chamberlain House, once home to an Oregon governor, and the oldest surviving church building in Albany—the former St. Paul's Methodist Church South. Once home to the oldest furniture factory west of the Mississippi, the district reflects the city's industrial and cultural growth.

Downtown Commercial District: Albany's original shopping hub since 1848, this district features preserved buildings from the 1800s and early 1900s. Many structures showcase cast iron details and ornate Italianate architecture—remnants of Albany's boom during the riverboat and railroad eras. Look closely and you'll spot decorative cornices, arched windows, and embossed iron columns that reflect the craftsmanship of the time.

Albany Municipal Airport: Established in 1909, Albany Municipal Airport is Oregon's oldest operating airport and arguably the third oldest in the U.S.—just six years after the Wright brothers' first flight. A short drive

from downtown takes you to this noteworthy piece of history. It was the first airport in the state listed on the National Register of Historic Places and remains one of the oldest in the country still in use. Don't miss the rare 1929 lattice truss hangar—a true architectural gem from aviation's early days. The airport's historic period (1926–1947) reflects the bold spirit of flight that helped shape the region.

The Albany Explorer App

Tour all three districts with the free Albany Explorer app, available on the Apple Store and Google Play. This self-guided tool features interactive maps, photos, and detailed information about many of Albany's historic buildings.

Don't miss the "Pioneering Women" guide—an interactive experience with mini biographies and videos that lead you to the places that shaped their lives.

The app also offers a variety of fun and helpful features, including top selfie spots, virtual postcards, and insider tips on where to eat, shop, and discover memorable experiences around town.

Honoring Veterans

Albany is well known for honoring veterans, particularly on Veterans Day through the Linn County Veterans Day Parade and Memorial Service.

Veterans Day Parade

If you're lucky enough to be in Albany, Oregon on Veterans Day, you're in for something truly special. Albany hosts the largest Veterans Day parade west of the Mississippi River—a beloved tradition that fills the streets with

marching bands, colorful floats, military vehicles, and heartfelt tributes to our nation's heroes. The celebration gets underway at 11 a.m., when downtown comes alive with pride and patriotism.

Albany's deep-rooted connection to this holiday dates back to 1919, just one year after the end of World War I. The original Armistice with Germany went into effect on November 11, 1918, bringing an end to what was then called "the war to end all wars." On November 11, 1919, the city joined others across the country in commemorating peace and honoring those who served—beginning a legacy of remembrance that continues today.

In Albany, the Veterans Day Parade itself began in the 1950s and quickly grew into a major event. By 1954, the parade stretched a mile long and drew dignitaries from Camp Adair, members of Congress, and Oregon's governor—making Linn County the place to be for Veterans Day celebrations. During this era, Hollywood also took notice, and celebrities like Audie Murphy, Raymond Burr, Bob Hope, Jesse Owens, and Governor Ronald Reagan added a touch of star power to the festivities.



Today, Albany's Veterans Day Parade remains a moving tribute to the courage, service, and sacrifice of America's veterans—a celebration shaped by decades of community pride and gratitude. Whether you're a local or a visitor, it's an experience you won't want to miss.



Veterans Memorial at Timber-Linn Memorial Park

Another meaningful way Albany honors veterans is through the Veterans Memorial at Timber-Linn Memorial Park. Built in 1969, the memorial recognizes Linn County service members who died in the Vietnam War. The original walls feature bronze plaques facing outward, while inscribed "sentry bricks" face inward toward the plaques—a symbolic gesture of support.

During a second expansion 40 years later, additional names of Linn County veterans who served in the Vietnam War were added, along with names (submitted by families) of veterans who served in other 20th-century conflicts. The project also offered the opportunity to sponsor engraved sentry bricks for \$50 each, paying tribute to any honorably serving veteran from anywhere in the United States.

Covered Bridges in Linn County

no truly appreciate the natural beauty of the ▲ Willamette Valley, you will want to explore a road less traveled and enjoy Linn County's collection of scenic covered bridges. The quaint structures evoke a simpler time when life moved a little slower and when builders put roofs over their bridges to protect the massive timbers from Oregon's rainy climate.

Early pioneers built the first covered bridges in Oregon, which later gave way to better-designed structures beginning in the early 20th Century. Due to a lack of steel during the world wars, and the abundance of Douglas fir, construction of these treasures continued well into the 1950s. Early on, trees were felled and hewn at the bridge site. Covering the bridges, while a beautiful addition to any span, had the practical application of keeping the wooden trusses dry. A covered bridge can last up to 80 years, while uncovered wooden bridges had about a nine-year lifespan.

At one time, there were about 450 covered bridges in Oregon. Today, just over 50 remain, but Oregon still has the largest collection of covered bridges in the West and one of the largest in the nation. Carefully maintained, most are still open to both pedestrian and vehicle traffic. Take the day and bike or drive your way to some of these impressive spans along quiet country roads.

There are eight bridges in Linn County, and five of the bridges are clustered not far from Albany around the town of Scio. They are marked by signs on a 30-mile loop that takes about two-and-a-half hours if you are driving. On that tour are the Hoffman Bridge, Gilkey Bridge, Shimanek Bridge, Hannah Bridge, and Larwood Bridge. Visitors can also stop by the bridges which interest them without completing the full loop. The closest bridge is Hoffman, which is located about 25 minutes from Albany.

The other three Linn County bridges are Weddle Bridge in Sweet Home, Short Bridge near Cascadia, and the Crawfordsville Bridge. The Crawfordsville Bridge, built in 1932, was bypassed in 1963 and is now open only to pedestrian traffic. It hosts the community's annual Bridge Day festival and even had a brush with fame as a filming location for the 1976 television movie The Flood—making it the only Linn County bridge known to have appeared in a film.

As you tour the bridges, notice the diagonal bracing and counter bracing of the beams in a crisscross pattern, both on the sides of the bridge and overhead under the roof. This is the Howe truss design, developed in 1840 by William Howe, which helps make the bridges stronger and last longer. Most of the bridges here were built in the 1930s and 1940s, with the exception of the Shimanek Bridge, built in 1966 to replace a span washed away in a flood. It is the only bridge in Linn County painted red rather than the traditional white, and received various repairs and updates recently, including new siding, a new truss, and other improvements.

Tribal Traditions at Grand Ronde

Stephanie Craig is part of the Yoncalla and Santiam Kalapuya tribes, among many others, and enrolled at the Confederated Tribes of Grand Ronde. Over the years, she has found her passion in the tribal tradition of basket weaving.

Or rather, she says, it found her.

While studying anthropology, archaeology and indigenous museum studies in college, she explored various Native American crafts, including lithics – crafting tools from stone. However, basketry has remained her true calling.

"I think the ancestors chose me because it comes so easily to me, and I really enjoy it," she says. "Being at the University of Oregon and working at the Museum of Natural History and Cultural History in Collections, I was drawn and connected even more with basketry. At that time, they had a huge picture on a wall of my family and their basketry, and working in the collections and seeing them daily, it allowed me to be able to create my basketry and exhibit it in public places."

Even though Craig is a weaver by trade, she didn't get instruction from her family. Tribal members were not allowed to practice basket weaving on the reservation. Craig's grandmother shared tales of gathering weaving materials with her grandparents, indicating that it had been several generations since anyone in their family had practiced the art of basket weaving. Her maternal family members took up sewing, crocheting and knitting, which were acceptable forms of weaving, and the handwork is very similar, she says.


"I was never pushed into it," Craig said about basket making. "I was always encouraged to participate in any way I could and embrace my heritage." However, when she visited her grandmother as a child, basketry was a constant presence, and their conversations often revolved around it. She didn't take up basketry until she was a teenager when she took a class with her mom "just for fun."

That's all it took.

Craig sought out mentors to enhance her skills. She took classes from elders and weavers from Washington, Oregon and California. During college, she started teaching and opened her business, Kalapuya Weaving and Consulting. She now teaches weaving classes throughout Oregon, as well as doing museum consulting on collections and best practices.

Monteith House Museum: Built in 1849, the Monteith House is Albany's first frame home and one of the most authentically restored pioneer–era residences in Oregon. Constructed from sawed lumber—an early innovation for the region—the house offers a vivid window into mid-19th century life in the Willamette Valley. Guided tours take visitors through period rooms featuring original furnishings used by the Monteith family, including items brought across the country during the Gold Rush era.

Today, the Monteith House stands as a tribute to Oregon's early settlers and the spirit that shaped the region. Throughout the year, the site hosts a variety of events, including Trolley of Terror, Sleigh Bell Sing, and monthly Living History Saturdays. 



Kitty the Unicorn and Lady Sophia

The Albany Historic Carousel & Museum is growing!

In 2025, two new animals will join the menagerie: Kitty, a European-style unicorn, and Lady Sophia, a dignified yet playful white standard poodle.

Kitty the Unicorn is named in honor of Kitty Doherty, who passed away in 2007 after a long and courageous battle with cancer. Her family had been given funds for a vacation that never came to be. In a heartfelt and unanimous decision, they chose to use that money to create something lasting—Kitty the Unicorn. This enchanting animal reflects Kitty's deep love for all creatures—including the mythical ones she adored. Purple, her favorite color, was the natural choice for the saddle. Medallions adorning the unicorn pay tribute to various members of her family, including her daughters. Perched in a place of honor on Kitty's rump is Exotic, her beloved cat, now enjoying the ultimate napping spot. Kitty's joyful spirit and boundless love for animals live on in this beautifully carved tribute. Kitty the Unicorn is lovingly sponsored by the entire Doherty family.

Also joining the carousel this year is Lady Sophia, a graceful white standard poodle sponsored by Robert and Katherine Lane. She is an inside-row alternate animal, specially designed to take the place of another animal if it needs to be removed for repairs. Lady Sophia was a beloved member of the Lanes' family, and she will arrive with two whimsical companions: a Siamese cat named Demetrius and a tiny mouse lounging playfully on her ear. With her head turned just so, Lady Sophia

appears to gaze coyly at you—a charming and elegant addition we are all excited to welcome.

Steering the Story Forward

There's someone new at the Carousel this year! Nicki Marazzani has joined the team as the new director. A lifelong learner, Nicki balances full-time school with her role at the Carousel, arriving each day with deep admiration for the carvers, painters, and the artistry that brings the animals to life. She especially loves working alongside the Carousel's dedicated volunteers. With over 35 years of experience in the non-profit world, Nicki brings not only expertise but a deep appreciation for the people who make it all possible—and she knows that nothing happens without them.

Paint, Sweat, and Years

Opened on August 15, 2017, the Carousel has welcomed over half a million visitors from all 50 states and more than 30 countries. Each animal on the carousel is hand-carved from basswood by a team of dedicated volunteers, guided by master carvers like Jack, who played a key role in shaping many of the carousel's beloved animals. Newer carvers shape the rough form, while masters refine the details—muscle tone, expression, and movement—that bring each figure to life. Even sponsors sometimes join in, and the Carousel also offers a unique opportunity for high school students to receive carving instruction. Upon

completing a class taught by master carvers, students are gifted the very tools they used—a meaningful way to continue the legacy of craftsmanship and creativity.

After the basswood is carved, the figure moves to the paint shop, where layers of color are meticulously brushed on, bringing life to the creature. Carvings take about 18 months to paint and require around 8 coats. Each coat of paint has to dry completely before adding the next. Once painted, the figure sits in the shop to cure for four to six months before receiving three coats of automotive clear finish for protection. Only after this final step can the animal take its place on the carousel to be enjoyed by visitors.

Over 15 years in the making, this whimsical wonder isn't quite finished—yet. With the addition of Kitty the Unicorn and Lady Sophia, the Carousel now features 47 hand-carved animals. Once complete, it will showcase 52 unique creatures, including 14 alternates that are rotated in for holidays or when animals are temporarily removed for care. About 30 percent of the menagerie is made up of horses, while the rest includes a delightful mix of real and imagined animals.

If You Go

Admission to the Carousel is free, and rides are just two dollars. In addition to enjoying a ride, visitors can take a guided tour of the carving studio and museum located in the basement. These behind-the-scenes tours offer a chance to see carvers at work and watch new animals being carved to life. The museum also features a fascinating exhibit of vintage carousel animals collected from across the country, offering a deeper look into the rich history of carousels.

If you get hungry, the Carousel Café offers lunch specials, Umpqua ice cream, and fresh popcorn. Several downtown restaurants are also within walking distance. Free parking is available throughout downtown Albany. While spaces near the Carousel are

limited, additional parking can be found two blocks southeast at Two Rivers Market. Be sure to check signage, as some areas near the Carousel require reverse diagonal parking.

The Carousel Gift Shop features unique souvenirs, carousel-themed treasures, and locally made gifts. In the shop, you can pick up a copy of "The Miracle on First Avenue." This inspiring book tells the story of the volunteers, the animals, and the remarkable journey of founder Wendy Kirbey, whose vision and persistence turned a wild idea into a beloved landmark in downtown Albany.

Planning a party, shower, or meeting? The Carousel has two charming party rooms available for rent, or you can reserve the entire space for a private event after hours. For those who want to get involved, the Carousel relies on a dedicated team of volunteers to help keep Albany's crown jewel shining. Visit AlbanyCarousel.com to learn more.

The Carousel wants to provide a fun and inviting space for everyone. Welcoming visitors with mobility challenges, the doors are equipped with push-button openers. The Carousel is wheelchair accessible with the help of a special deck matching the height of the loading platform. A chariot with a locking mechanism keeps wheels in place. The bathrooms are fully accessible, as is the museum downstairs, which can be reached by elevator.

The Sensory Friendly Morning at the carousel is offered every Wednesday from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. This quieter, gentler experience features a slower carousel speed, softer organ music, and complimentary earplugs—ideal for individuals with sensory sensitivities and anyone who prefers a calmer environment.



Wheel the World specializes in gathering and publishing detailed, verified accessibility information for destinations around the globe. Their platform allows travelers with disabilities to plan trips with clarity and ease, based on reliable data and firsthand assessments.

Working with the Albany Visitors Association, Wheel the World conducted on-site accessibility evaluations of nine Albany businesses. These included Loafers Station, the Albany Historic Carousel & Museum, Albany Civic Theater, PIX Theatre, Phoenix Inn Suites, Albany Regional Museum, Comfort Suites Linn County Fairgrounds, Best Western Plus Prairie Inn, and The Barn at Hickory Station—a local food truck hub. Each location was chosen to represent the variety of experiences Albany offers and was evaluated for features like accessible entrances, clear pathways, restrooms, and overall ease of use for visitors with mobility challenges.

The results of these evaluations are now available on the Wheel the World platform, providing travelers with the tools they need to plan an inclusive and informed visit. At the same time, the assessments offer valuable insights for businesses, encouraging improvements that benefit both residents and visitors.




















Explore the Outdoors

Your guide to outdoor recreation from town to trailhead

Albany is your base for fresh-air fun—paddle the river, bike scenic backroads, or explore wooded trails just beyond town. Stroll riverside paths, chase waterfalls, or let the kids splash and play. However you like to move, there's a way to enjoy it here.

Monteith Park

Located just steps from Historic Downtown, Monteith Riverpark is a must-visit stop for anyone exploring Albany's scenic riverfront. Reopened in July 2024 after a major renovation, the park now features a modern amphitheater with a brand-new stage, a nature-themed playground, a splash pad, and rebuilt overlooks with views of the Willamette River.

Monteith Riverpark is designed for ease of access, with designated wheelchair seating in the amphitheater, a central handrail on the main stairway, and smooth, paved connections to the Dave Clark Trail—ideal for wheelchairs, walkers, and strollers.

Splash Pad: Traveling with kids? Pack a towel and let them cool off at the splash pad, open daily from Memorial Day through Labor Day, 10 a.m. to 8 p.m.

(Tip: If you plan to visit the **Albany Historic Carousel** & **Museum**—just up the hill—ride first, then splash. Clean, dry riders help protect the hand-carved carousel animals.)

Playground: The new nature-inspired playground invites kids of all ages to climb, slide, and explore. Shaded seating areas make it a relaxing stop for families on the go.

River Rhythms: If you're visiting in summer, check the schedule for River Rhythms, a free outdoor concert series where the new stage sets the scene for evenings of music and community fun.

Dave Clark Trail: The park connects directly to the Trail, a 1.5-mile riverside path perfect for a scenic stroll or bike ride along the Willamette. Along the way, stop in at Deluxe Brewing, located right off the trail, or venture just a block farther to Calapooia Brewing, a longtime local favorite known for its casual atmosphere and house-crafted beer and spirits.

Urban Trails

Albany's network of urban trails weaves through parks, greenbelts, and neighborhoods—ideal for walking, biking, and spotting local wildlife without leaving the city.

Periwinkle Creek Trail stretches 1.8 miles along Periwinkle Creek, connecting Grand Prairie Park to the Albany Boys & Girls Club. This paved path offers a quiet, tree-lined route for walking, jogging, or biking.

Cox Creek & Waverly Lake Loop combines a 0.65-mile trail along Cox Creek with a 0.70-mile loop around scenic Waverly Lake, where visitors can enjoy views of waterfowl, shade trees, and the city's famous wood duck decoy during the summer.

Oak Creek Greenbelt Trail winds 1.8 miles through natural areas between Teloh Calapooia Park and the Calapooia River. Its soft-surface path offers a peaceful setting for walkers and nature lovers.

Timber Linn Park Trail is a 1.47-mile paved loop through open fields and along Price Road. Located within Timber Linn Memorial Park, it's perfect for a relaxed stroll or an easy bike ride.

Fishing

Whether you're casting from the bank, launching a kayak, or planning a day on the reservoir, the Albany area offers plenty of ways to enjoy the water.

Waverly Lake, Timber Linn Lake, and Freeway Lakes are stocked each spring with legal-sized trout by the Oregon Department of Fish & Wildlife. These easy-access spots are ideal for families and casual anglers. Waverly and Timber Linn are located within city parks, while Freeway Lakes are just southeast of town and offer more seclusion.

E.E. Wilson Pond, just northwest of Albany, is another great family-friendly fishing spot stocked with trout in the spring. It's especially suited for young or beginning anglers.

Foster Reservoir and **Green Peter Reservoir**, east of Sweet Home, offer larger-scale boating, fishing, and water recreation. Both are stocked with trout, bass, and kokanee. Boat launches, picnic areas, and campgrounds make these reservoirs popular day-trip destinations.

Willamette & Santiam Rivers are known for seasonal runs of Chinook salmon and steelhead. Bank and boat anglers alike find success in spring and fall. Fly fishing is also popular on tributaries in east Linn County, where cold, fast-moving streams challenge even experienced anglers. Water Play & Paddling

From splash pads to scenic floats, Albany offers a variety of ways to enjoy the water—whether you're paddling, swimming, or cooling off with the kids.

Waverly Lake and Timber-Linn Memorial Park are peaceful spots for personal kayaks, canoes, paddleboards, and RC boats. Both parks are great places to take a walk or have a picnic.

Monteith Riverpark, near Historic Downtown, features a riverside splash pad open daily from Memorial Day through Labor Day, 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. It's a great stop for families exploring the nearby carousel or trails, and also includes a nature-inspired playground.

COOL! Pool, located at Swanson Park Action Center, includes a zero-depth entry, 36-foot slide, lazy river, and play structure. Open daily from the end of the school year until Labor Day. 705 Railroad Street SE 541-967-4521 | AlbanyOregon.gov/Parks

Kayaking in and around Albany is a great way to explore the region's natural beauty at a relaxed pace. A favorite short float begins at **Michael's Landing** in Corvallis and ends at **Bowman Park**, a safe and

Safety First

Whether you're paddling, wading, or swimming, safety comes first. Always wear a properly fitted life jacket—free youth life vests are available through the City of Albany's Life Jacket Program. Kiosks can be found at Albany Fire Stations as well as Bowman and Bryant Parks in the summer. Find out more at AlbanyOregon.gov.

Be alert for underwater hazards like rocks and submerged wood, and share the water respectfully with other users, including motorboats. Respect private property along the riverbanks, and help protect these natural spaces by following Leave No Trace principles: pack out your trash, avoid disturbing wildlife, and leave the landscape as you found it.

convenient take-out in Albany. For a quieter experience, Freeway Lakes southeast of town offer calm waters best suited for paddling between October and June. Guided tours for both locations are available through OregonKayakTours.com.

Bowman Park and Bryant Park both offer river access, shaded picnic areas, and space to relax and play. Bowman Park features a rustic boat ramp and is a popular spot for swimming during the summer months. Bryant Park is located at the confluence of the Calapooia and Willamette rivers, providing opportunities for river access and recreation.

Day Hikes & Forest Adventures

Albany is perfectly positioned for day trips into the foothills, forests, and scenic wilderness areas of the Willamette Valley and Cascade Range.

McDowell Creek Falls County Park, located east of Lebanon, offers a rewarding 1.8-mile loop hike through lush forest with wooden bridges and viewing platforms. The trail follows McDowell Creek past three waterfalls, including Royal Terrace Falls and Majestic Falls. It's a favorite for families and photographers, with picnic areas and a refreshing, misty atmosphere in the warmer months. More county parks can be found at LinnParks.com.

Willamette National Forest lies just an hour east of Albany and includes nearly 1,700 miles of trails, ranging from accessible nature walks to remote wilderness treks. While many trails are high elevation, several low-elevation routes are hikeable year-round. Visit FS.USDA.gov/Willamette for trail updates.

Siuslaw National Forest stretches to the west and offers a completely different landscape—coastal hills, old-growth trees, and fern-filled canyons. The closest access points are about an hour's drive from Albany, making it an easy half-day or full-day getaway for nature lovers. Check out <u>FS.USDA.gov/Siuslaw</u> for more information.

Peavy Arboretum & McDonald Forest, located just 20 minutes west near Corvallis, features a well-maintained trail network used by hikers, runners, and mountain bikers. Trails range from short loops to steeper climbs with scenic views. It's a great introduction to the ecology of the region and a peaceful escape close to town. These forests are part of the College of Forestry at Oregon State University.

Golf

Whether you're looking for a casual afternoon on the greens or a more challenging round, the Albany area offers a variety of golf courses to suit all skill levels.

Golf Club of Oregon, just across the river from downtown, is an 18-hole public course established in 1929. With tree-lined fairways and a relaxed atmosphere, it's a convenient option for travelers looking to squeeze in a quick round. 905 Springhill Drive NW | 541-928-8338 TheGolfClubOfOregon.com

Other notable courses nearby include Mallard Creek Golf Course & RV Resort in Lebanon, Trysting Tree Golf Club in Corvallis, and Elkhorn Valley Golf Course near Lyons—each offering their own scenic fairways and challenges.

Disc Golf

Albany features several courses for players of all skill levels. Bryant Park, near downtown, has a full 18-basket course in a forested setting. Smaller 9-basket layouts can be found at Timber-Linn Memorial Park and Deerfield Park, each offering a different mix of open and shaded terrain. All are free to use and open year-round.

Pickleball

The city has embraced this fast-growing sport with indoor and outdoor options. The Mid-Willamette Family YMCA offers over 50 hours of indoor play weekly with paddles available to borrow. Day passes are available; see YMCAAlbany.org for current rates. Outdoor play is available at Eleanor Hackleman Park, home to resurfaced public courts, and Linn-Benton Community College, which features eight dedicated courts and additional lined courts for flexible use. The Albany Pickleball Club often hosts meetups and welcomes visitors. For maps and info, visit AlbanyPickleball.com.

Biking the Valley

With scenic country roads, covered bridges, and a nationally designated bikeway, Albany is a great starting point for two-wheeled adventures.


Passing directly through Historic Downtown Albany, the Willamette Valley Scenic Bikeway offers 132 miles of picturesque riding from Champoeg State Park to Eugene. Cyclists can ride short sections or tackle the whole route, enjoying river views, rolling farmland, and small-town charm along the way.

The Covered Bridge Tour is a popular 30-mile self-guided ride starting in Albany and looping through the countryside to nearby Scio, where several of Linn

County's historic covered bridges can be visited in a single trip. Ride through peaceful farmland, stop for photos, and take in the views.

Ride north into **Wine Country** or take a route south to beautiful historic **Brownsville**, both accessible via quiet backroads. For a unique stop, plan a detour to **Thompson's Mills State Heritage Site**, Oregon's oldest operating water-powered mill, which is open for tours.

If the thrill of off-road riding is more your style, head for the hills surrounding Albany. Just 14 miles west, the McDonald-Dunn Forest—managed by Oregon State University—offers a network of wooded trails popular with mountain bikers, hikers, and runners. Farther west, Marys Peak is the highest mountain in the Coast Range. Its 4,097-foot summit rewards cyclists with sweeping views to the Pacific Ocean. Bicycles are allowed on the East Ridge, North Ridge, and Tie Trails. To the east, the Willamette National Forest maintains a range of mountain biking trails. The South Santiam Travel Corridor is closest to Albany, while the McKenzie Travel Corridor farther east is one of the most renowned in the state.

Buses




